Our focus book is '**Zog**' by Julia Donaldson.

<p>Read/ listen to the story of 'Zog' by Julia Donaldson. https://www.dailymotion.com/video/x65bulb</p>	<p>Which words rhyme in the story? Can you think of your own rhyming words?</p> <p>Look up any words from the story that you are unsure of their meaning such as: implore, coarse, triumph</p>
<p>Watch Zog on BBC iPlayer https://www.bbc.co.uk/iplayer/episode/b0bwdw8y/zog</p>	<p>Design your own dragon. This could be using anything you like! It could be a drawing, painting, playdough, chalk or you could even use some recycling.</p>
<p>Write a description to describe either Zog or your own dragon. Can you use a range of punctuation (. ! ?) and conjunctions (and, because, but, so) Don't forget to use expanded noun phrases and e.g. My dragon has sharp, purple claws. Remember to also use the apostrophe for belonging e.g. Zog's skin is orange and scaly.</p>	<p>Draw some different size dragon tongues and measure their lengths.</p> <p>If you don't have a ruler or tape at home, you can use anything you want (beads, gems, rice, pasta, small toys etc)</p> <p>Can you make your own ruler?</p>
<p>It's important for dragons like Zog to be able to fly. When was the first time humans were able to fly? Do some research about the Wright Brothers.</p>	<p>Zog's school friends and teacher end up keeping the horse as a pet. Write a set of instructions for the dragons on how to care for a horse. You may need to do your own research to help them!</p>
<p>The Princess and Knight want to be doctors. What do you want to be when you are older? You could write about this or draw a picture.</p>	<p>Zog needed a plaster. Have you got many plasters at home? Can you count them all? Can you put them in size order?</p> <p>If you haven't got plasters, you could do this with some of your toys.</p>
<p>Do some daily exercise. You could do Joe Wicks PE lessons on YouTube at 9am every morning or Visit Go Noodle https://family.gonoodle.com/</p> <p>Challenge yourself to improve your catching skills. How many times can you throw something in the air and catch it?</p>	<p>Visit the Exotic Zoo Education centre online and learn about different animals.
